



The Class of 1974 leaves Lincoln at a time when higher education in America is suffering its greatest trauma of self-doubt. At least that is the feeling of the prestigious Carnegie Commission on Higher Education which is concluding its monumental six-year study at this time.

We at Lincoln wonder about that. We wonder because one hundred years ago, in 1854, Lincoln closed two schools, its School of Medicine and its School of Law, which in terms of public need should never have been closed. So Lincoln in 1974 should be looking towards the restoration of programs that it once had.

We have no self-doubt. In a society with more than 300,000 physicians, but with less than 6,000 of them Black, when 40,000 would be Black had there been true equality of opportunity, Lincoln knows its role clearly. And, of course, medicine is only an example — in engineering the situation is even worse: last year more than 44,000 degrees were granted in engineering with about 400 being earned by Blacks.

Thus, you leave Lincoln at a time when the overall climate is filled with pessimism, but at a time when you and I know full well that your talents, your dedication, your involvement are needed now as much or more than they have ever been before in our history. Hard work is a necessity: these things are beyond the reach of good intentions.

You have made the beginning. Somewhere I read, "If a man neglects education, he walks lamely to the end of his life." Graduating from Lincoln you can stand tall and walk vigorously — but with conviction not with arrogance. Lincoln has been that supportive but non-restrictive community in which you have been able to explore, to experiment and even to fail, but you have been supported in a net of meaning so that a fall has not been forever, nor was a failure final.

Sing a song full of the hope that **the present has brought us;**


Facing the rising sun

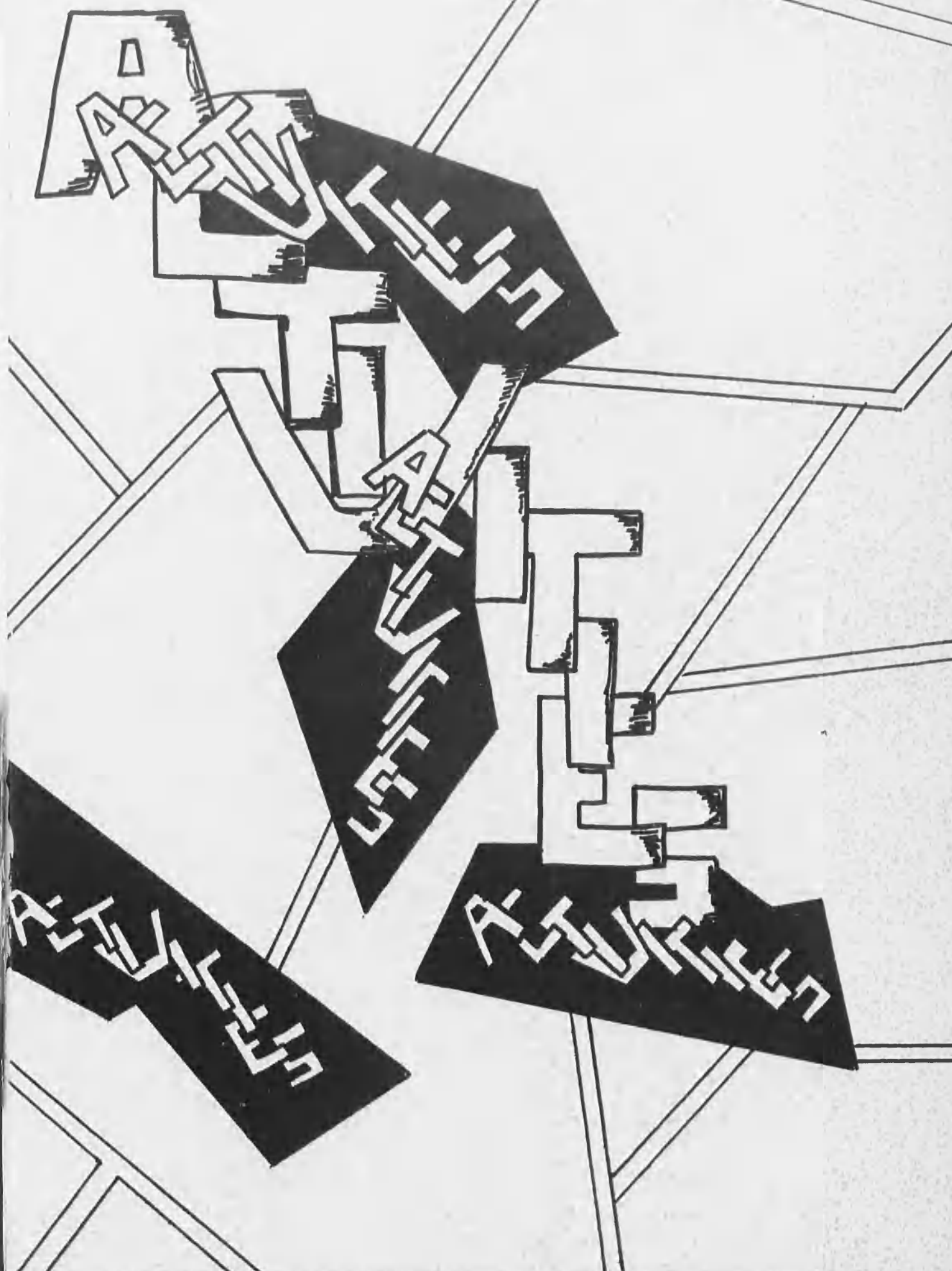

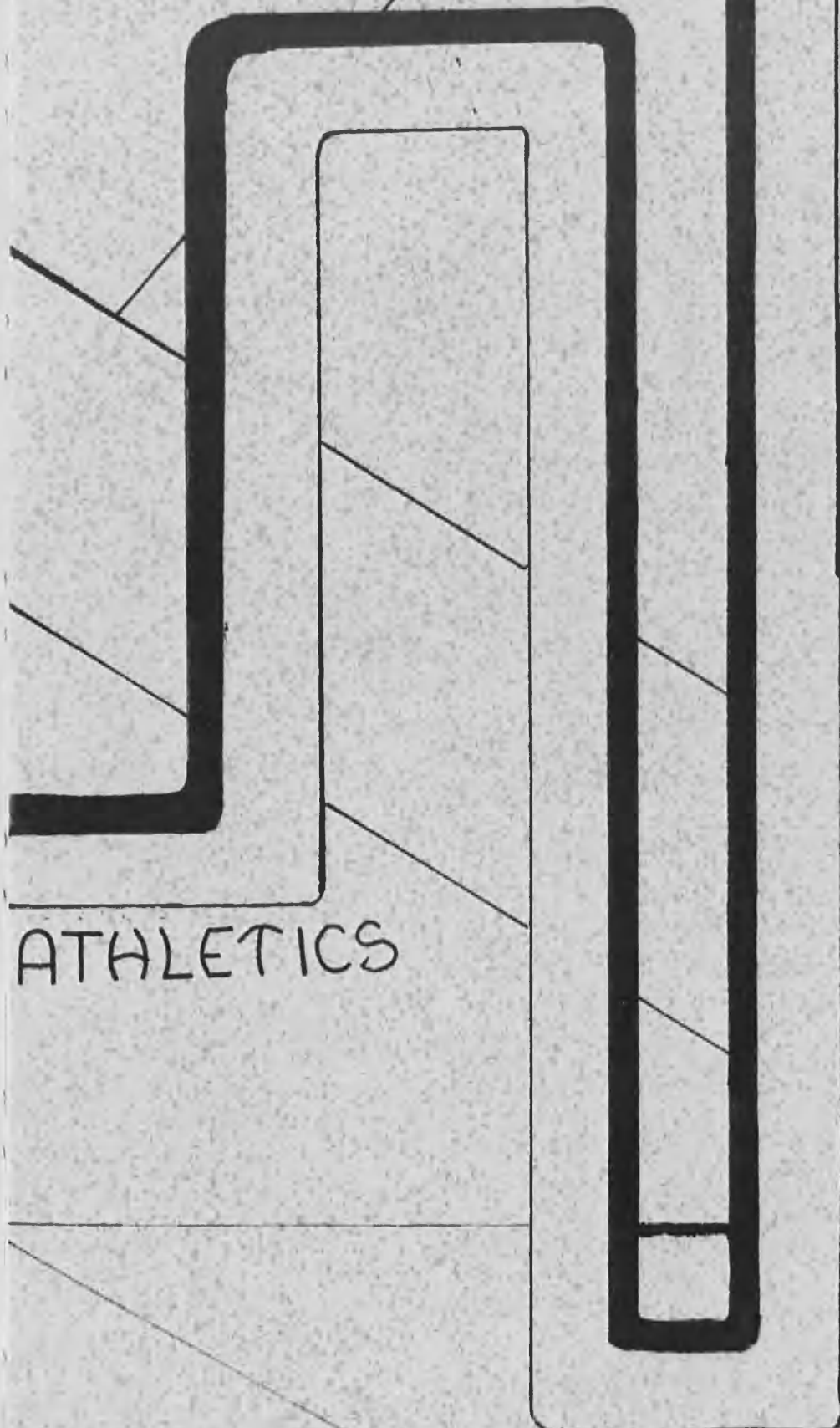

## '74 IN ALL

The Date: September 9, 1970

The Place: Anywhere **north, south, east, or west** of Oxford, Pa.

The Time: Any hour before 9:00 a.m.

"... Where the hell are we now? It's been six hours since we left Philadelphia." "Oh my lord, Harold, you are out in the country..." Right On! Just can't wait to get into the minds of those heavy brothers and sisters at Lincoln University — **The Black School**. "Excuse me, could you please tell me the way to Lincoln University — you've never heard of it, Oh I see... Yeah, I'm sure — the brochure said it was an all **male** school... I picked it because I want to major in education, and Lincoln's the place to go."

"Oh Rita, I have nothing to worry about — Sharon doesn't need the **pill**, they have restricted dorms" ... the campus picture on the post card is beautiful... and I hope no one notices my big nose..."

And so it went on until you arrived at the great archway reading, "Lincoln University — condemned." What a sight for sore eyes and tired behinds that have grown numb from the long ride. You've heard so many stories and gone through so many hassles, you are ready to deal — strange, but Lincoln does that. And now you are about to partake of four of the wildest, most meaningful and crucial years of your life.

**Registration** at the great Grim Gym; **confrontation** at the Financial Aid Office; **frustration** at the Student Union Building; **hesitation** at your dormitory; **indigestion** at the cafeteria; **aggravation** by the hot weather and hassles; finally **humiliation** by the upperclassmen. And you've only begun at The Lincoln University.

Dean Carl Thomas in the chapel, welcomes you and your parents to a delightful day at Lincoln. "And if you feel that you can not make it here, then by all means you must go down to our second rate competitor down the road, Cheyney State College."

He smokes too much for you, but after it's over you give a sigh of relief. Don't worry, he's only here to help you out and give you encouragement. But after you're settled, your parents leave and you wonder what it's gonna be like — can you handle yourself. "I'm gonna miss them and their good cooking."

Okay, a series of tests follow and a party in the Quadrangle to give a touch of Lincoln. Next identification cards and pictures, numbers and signs wherever you go. Now you must get dressed for the banquet — steaks and butter knives — how common. Meet the faculty and enjoy the food. On to Brandywine Park for your freshmen class picnic — bee stings, three broken down buses, cold chicken sandwiches, orange drinks, greasy potato chips and an orange. "Lessons in Lincoln boredom" don't worry you passed. Last night before classes start and you are quietly in your dorm.

Then the noise in the quad and you are being called out by 600 drunk upperclassmen "Freshmen punks, take the wall suckers, wanna fight — come on over, jive niggers." You're scared but trying not to show it — and then it hits you — a beer can. Rush and in four hours, it's over, the upperclassmen are defeated and 200 tired freshmen go back to their rooms. The quad is a mess — \$150 worth of damage to flowers and McRary and the Kappa Tree are decorated with panties, bras, girdles, G-strapes, stockings, socks and other assorted items.

Then tomorrow comes and it's the 114th year of classes at The Lincoln University. You wake up, start classes and get evil looks from the Sophomores, Juniors and Seniors you beat up the night before. "Don't mess with the preps' — they're bad as sh\_\_!" And so you're finally into that freshman year and the Lincoln campus: Good Luck!

Your mid-terms are so soon, so naturally you study, or as we said then "fight some sh\_\_." During Homecoming we find Roberta Black dynamite. Dorm meetings and rapping with your roommates and fellow freshmen, Friendships start, relationships begin and partying is major part of you — let's express it every weekend — Solid! The fraternities and sororities entrance you with song and dance and bright colors. But Ebony United says "get back to Black" then express your Greek-self, if necessary, later on.

The basketball games start and the Friday night Student Union card games begin — "Crazy 8's anyone?" Pep rallies and lots of excitement — '74 is definitely on the move. Kool and the Gangs are here for Christmas and its time to see the "Funky Man" but tomorrow you have your final exams — so study. Party last night, pass today; home here we come — but Lincoln is yours for January.

January ends with the biggest snowball fight of the century and again damages result. But remember, it's all okay because "We, the Class of 1974, are the handpicked, highly selected class." Second semester is back and now the dealing is on again. Spring Concerts, exams, Easter break and a school strike — the need for a doctor we fight for it — no more deaths on campus."

Anguish and hesitation from all the Smokers and Rushes and pep talk form everywhere. "What line should I pledge?" Your mind is made up and **everyone** in your class is on line — boy is your class sticking together. After the first week though the lines begin to dwindle — thanks to slaps and "the wood." One of the pyramids broke her leg, but that didn't stop her from making the rounds to McRary for the every weekend-party-but-
