Tuesday June 10th 1834

The Executive Committee met at 5 O'clock P.M.

Present, Messrs. Cresson, Mifflin, Dickson, Johnson, Jenden & Davidson.

The Committee was organized by appointing Cresson Chairman & R. B. Davidson Secretary.

The following Resolution passed by the Board of Managers on the 6th June was then read.

Resolved, That the Executive Committee extensively circulate, in our own city & suburbs, a circular, asking the assistance of our fellow citizens in the important work undertaken by the Society; and pursue the most vigorous steps for completing the sum of \$10,000, by dividing the City & suburbs into small districts, & appointing Collecting Committees in each.

Mr. Cresson then read a rough draft of an Address, to the Public, prepared by Mr. Preckenridge; which was adopted by the Committee & 2500 copies ordered to be printed for distribution besides publishing it in the News-Papers. The Chairman & Secretary were charged with the execution of it.

The above Resolution of the Board was ordered to be printed with the address, as well as the Constitution & list of Officers.

The Chairman & Secy were also directed to have prepared 250 Subscription Books, with the Constitution of the Society annexed.

Letters from Howard Stansbury respecting the expedition to Passa Cove & from Walter Lewis in regard to the slaves left by Dr. Marvers were read by Elliot Creason.

On Motion Resolved That the Chairman be requested to lay before the next meeting of the Committee an estimate of the stores & implements necessary for the emigrant to be sent out.

On Motion Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to prepare a Code of Laws for the government of the Colony. To be reported to the Executive Committee at their next meeting. Messrs Bell, Johnson, Dicken & Jaudon were appointed the Committee.

The Committee then adjourned to meet the following week on Thursday at the same place & hour.

Thursday evening July 17th 1834

The Committee met at Dr. Bell's office.

Present Messrs Bell, Cresson & Davidson.

The subject referred to the Committee by the Board at their last meeting having been called up, the following Report & resolution presented by Dr. Bell was unanimously adopted.

Report of the Executive Committee, to whom was referred by the Board of Managers, the subject of the kind of auxiliary connexion & relations which the Young Men's Colonization Society of Pennsylvania, should maintain with the American Colonization Society at Washington, and the conditions on which the former agrees to receive from the latter the manumitted slaves of the Rev. Dr. Munes of Virginia, with a view to their being located in a new settlement on the Coast of Africa; Report.

That the known and admitted advantages of position of the Parent Board at Washington & of the composition of the American Colonization Society; of which it is the Executive branch; forbid the idea of independent action by Societies formed on the model of this one. The Young Men's Colonization Society of Pennsylvania distinctly admits in its Constitution its auxiliary character, now it is content with affirming a merely nominal connexion of this kind with the Parent Board. It has carefully abstained from extending its sphere of action beyond the State of Pennsylvania, & within these limits it proposes to make the proceeds of its labor not merely subservient to the general objects of Colonization in Africa, but to dispose of them in such a manner as shall meet with the approbation of the Parent Board.

The latter by its location at the seat of government

is enabled to unite in the great cause of Colonization the North & the South & to procure joint action between portions of Country & its inhabitants which could not be done by a Society in any other Section of the Union. It is moreover requisite that there should be a Central Society or board to exercise a general superintendance over all the settlements on the Coast of Africa; the better to preserve among them the necessary harmonious intercourse & other relations. This Board is also the best fitted to keep the whole United States apprized of the Progress & wants of the whole of the African Colonies, and thus to enable the former to transmit, with knowledge of the circumstances, the pecuniary and other assistance which they may propose from time to time to furnish to the latter.

It must on the other hand be conceded, that an auxiliary such as that of the Young Men's Colonization Society of Pennsylvania enjoys means & facilities for furthering the common cause superior in some respects to those possessed by the Parent Board. Among these may be mentioned the readiness of a direct appeal to a large & wealthy population for countenance & aid - an appeal which moreover would be perhaps coldly responded to if made by any Society whatever at a distance. Next in the list of peculiar advantages is the location of the Young Men's Society in a Commercial City, by which greater economy & dispatch in the transportation of Emigrants & in the outfits for them & the Colony in general are insured. It is also an encouraging circumstance that some of the members are themselves Merchants & men of business, practically conversant with the marketable value & price of goods, utensils &c. for the Colony.

In view of these advantages, it can hardly

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be expected that the auxiliary operations of the Young
Men's Society of Pennsylvania should be restricted to
a mere collection & distribution of funds to order for
the Parent Society, without at the same time, a di-
-rect participation in Council & executive action
with the latter. But as the exercise of this right
could only be salutary & efficient after a full
knowledge of all the circumstances connected with
the condition of the Colonies & the resources of the
Parent Board; and as the information requisite
for a due enlightenment on the subject can hardly be in
the possession of an auxiliary Society, the latter must
either refrain from all joint Council & legislation with
the Parent Board or take a particular line of action
tending to a specific end. This has been already done
by some of the State Auxiliaries with the consent of the
Society at Washington, and it is now proposed to be
entered on by ~~the~~ Society and its Board of Managers
in Pennsylvania.

The Scheme to the accomplishment of
which the energies of this Society are now to be directed
is, the founding of a new Settlement on the Coast of
Africa, under the auspices of the Parent Board; and
yet with such modifications & reforms as would
render it difficult for the latter to assume at once
the entire responsibility without an admission of
continued wrong done to other Colonists & the Settlements
now in existence. Just so far as these modifications
and reforms extend, would it be necessary to have
different or amended local laws and regulations, if
not a different executive agency - as when it is pro-
-posed in the new Colony that more attention and
encouragement shall be given to agriculture, ^{importation} the man-
-ufacture & sale of ardent Spirits prohibited; and an

improved plan adopted I acted on of supplying the public stores & for the issue by gift or sale of their contents to the Colonists & native inhabitants. But as the Parent Board is entitled to reap its share of success & increased reputation to the cause of Colonization even in measures not of its own suggestion & origination, its counsel & guidance are invoked in the present enterprise by the Young Men's Society of Pennsylvania. The Auxiliary here invites the sanction of the Principal to the measures now in progress by the latter, for the selection & purchase of land for a new Colony, the appointment of a home agent & a governor & the enactment of such laws as experience shall indicate in addition to or in modification of those already in force in Liberia. Until the sanction by formal consent be given to these steps as well as those which may be afterwards taken towards the attainment of the great objects in view - Colonizing & Christianizing Africa, the Young Men's Society will feel itself deprived of that countenance & support to which it looks with continued hope & affection. It is proposed, moreover, the better to insure joint action & to preserve to the Parent Board its right of general superintendence, that a Special agent should from time to time be dispatched from Monrovia to visit the new Colony & be instructed to give his aid and counsel towards maintaining a right understanding between it and the other Colonies on the coast.

With these explanations, made in a spirit of perfect good will & fellowship, of their understanding of the auxiliary connexion and relations which the Young Men's Colonization Society of Pennsylvania have with the Parent Board at Washington, the Executive Committee submit the following Resolutions

Resolved That the Board of Managers of the Y. Meis Coloniza-
 -tion Society of Penn^a - Agree to the terms proposed in
 the Second Resolution, of the Parent Board, recently
 received, respecting the transmission by the latter to
 the former, as from principal to auxiliary, of the
 manumitted Slaves of the late Doctor Hives of
 Virginia; and that they will proceed forthwith to
 complete the necessary arrangements for a new
 colony at or near Passa More, the first settlers
 of which are to be the said liberated Slaves.

The Committee recommended to the Board the
 appointment of Capt. Abels as collector of the
 Monies subscribed at Public Meetings.

Resolved That it is inexpedient in the infant state of our Colony to accept the offer of Mrs Page, but we will if thought proper, transmit the slaves to the old Colony at Grand Pappan on payment of the \$500 to our Society.

Resolved That it be recommended to the Board to adopt the Resolution proposed at the last meeting, recommending that Public Meetings be held on the 24th Oct. 22nd Feb; Anniversary week in May & 4th of July.

Resolved That 100 Copies of Dr. Keese's Review of the 1st Annual Report of the Am. Anti Slavery Socy. & 50 Copies of Heidey's Appeal be subscribed for.

Resolved That the Chairman (who is also Cashier of the Socy) be directed to write to Howard F. Thornton, Walter Hawes & Rev. Francis Thornton informing them of our determination to send out the expedition as soon as possible & to request them to have the slaves ready for their departure.

The following resolutions were recommended to the Board to be passed by them.

Resolved, That while we deeply regret the loss of our friend

Dr. Wm. M. Howell's valuable services for so long a period, we nevertheless hope to derive much aid from his labors in behalf of our holy cause among our Southern brethren, & further

Resolved, That the Rev. Wm. M. Howell be respectfully solicited to present the claims of our association & its principles to the confidence and affection of the South; and to select and encourage to emigrate to Bapa Cove, men of character, energy, ability & piety - especially valuable mechanics & persons skilled in the culture of rice, cotton, sugar & indigo - and to offer them ample grants of land for the cultivation of those articles.

The Committee adjourned to meet this night week, at same place & hour.

penalties.

Natives Natives to be treated with justice & kindness & efforts
made to win them to civilized pursuits. to be paid
fairly for their labor & fines inflicted when wages
are unjustly withheld - their children to participate
fully in the benefit of schools; & they to be encouraged
to settle on farms within the territorial limit.

Trade Trade to be confined for a limited period to Government
factory & peddling prohibited.

Agriculture Agriculture to be fostered - the growth of Corn & plantains
introduced & premiums for the raising of Cotton, Coffee &c
offered.

Farms Farms 30 acres in the interior - 100 to be given where
Cotton, Coffee & Sugar shall be planted extensively
with a view to export.

Town lots Town lots 50 by 200 feet - out lots 5 to 10 acres ac-
-cording to size of family.

Houses Houses to be occupied by first emigrants with the un-
-derstanding that similar improvements shall within
2 years be put on adjoining lots. for which deeds in fee
simple will be granted as speedily as possible, a sub-
-stantial ware house & accommodations for the general

- purposes of the Colony to be erected also houses for second Expedition.
- Maintenance Maintenance for 6 months when needful, & even longer at the discretion of the Agent in peculiar cases. The Agents & Council to determine the amount of labour to be rendered by each emigrant as remuneration for his passage & subsequent support & extra labour to be paid by valuation of the Agent: regular accounts to be kept with each Colonist & with the Society.
- Accounts Quarterly accounts & Statement of affairs to be regularly transmitted to the Society.
- Register A Register of all emigrants, their ages, origin, pursuits & a record of deaths with the causes &c shall be kept so as to secure an accurate census & to shew the effect of climate on emigrants.
- Public Farm A Public Farm shall be established to prevent idleness & vagrancy. as well as to promote the growth of all valuable plants: — Efforts, ^{shall be} made to promote an early export of all valuable Staples of the Country. viz. Coffee, Cotton, rice, Sugar, pepper, Cam wood, timber, gold dust, ivory, hides, wax, goat skins, tortoise shell, palm oil, drugs, gums &c. To awaken an extended interest in the Cause of Africa, her products & manufactures generally should be shipped.
- Capital Capital to be located with reference to the great cardinal interests of the present Colonists & future State.
- Townships Townships two miles square, reserving in the centre of each sufficient space for Schools, Churches & other public purposes.
- Counties Ten miles square each, as nearly as convenient.
- Schools Every township shall have at least one school & the Manual labour Seminary to be commenced at the earliest possible period.

Mr. Cresson read a letter from Professor Lee of Wash-
-ington College - Stating that the Professors of that
Institution would undertake a temporary agency as
requested by us.

Mr. Cresson also read a letter from Edward G.
Mankins relative to his intended embarkation
for Africa.

The descriptive parts of John Morse's letter to the
Society was ordered to be printed & published.

The proposition, respecting the free blacks of Savannah,
contained in Mr. Thos. Clay's letter, was deferred in
consequence of a communication being received
from the N. York Colonization Society respecting
them & our proposed connection with the N. York
Society.

No further business was presented & the Committee
Adjourned.

The Sub-Committee appointed to have Mr. Tyson's address published Reported that they had had 2,000 copies of the Address & 1,000 of the Report of the Committee to Norfolk - together with S. Benedict's letter; printed, and that they were now distributing the same.

After conversation with Mr. Buchanan & interchange of sentiment respecting the duties of Sub-Agent, it was Resolved, That the Sub-Agent should devote a portion of his time in advancing the interests of the Society through the press - by calling on the Editors of papers & engaging their influence; - through the Pulpit - by conversation with the Clergy & inducing them to present the Subject to their respective Congregations - and also by endeavoring to form local & congregational auxiliaries.

Resolved That the Rev. Mr. Rethum be requested to address a Circular letter to the Clergy throughout the State, invoking their influence in behalf of the Colonization Cause.

Mr. Caldwell's bill of expenses to Norfolk, was presented & ordered to be paid.

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Superintend the embarkation of the emigrants

 passengers with their furniture &c cleared on
 the 24th of Oct. for Africa and went to sea on the
 25th

For a more particular account of the sailing
 of the staves the Committee refer the Board to the
 full and minute report of their Virginia Com.
 which was laid before them immediately after
 the return of that Committee from Norfolk. They
 also up. the said report in the Minute
 Book of the C. Committee (Copied from the original
 documents) for the number, ages & occupations of the
 emigrants, a full account of which may there be
 found and which was also presented to the Board
 in November last. A memorandum of the
 Merchandise &c of the Bills for which are now
 copied into the Committee's minute Book
 amounting with Insurance and Charter to \$300,82
 is herewith presented: this together with the
 two documents above alluded to, will it is believed
 furnish the Board with every particular respecting
 the Expedition of staves

The Committee having now complied with
 the requisition of the Board, feel it due to
 themselves to state the Cause of the omission in
 their minutes of the transactions of Nov. 3rd the
 evening on which the Virginia Committee
 reported. The constant engagements of the
 purchasing Committee previous to the said
 meeting together with the fact before alluded
 to viz the purchase of Tobacco in Virginia renders
 it absolutely impossible to make any report to the
 Board previous to the ^{present} meeting. At that meeting
 the rough minutes of the Committee together with

The report of the Virginia Committee, Register of Emigrants and Invoices were presented to the Board. The minutes of the Ex. Com. went into the hands of the then Recording Secretary of the Board, were by him mistaken and never returned to the Secretary of the Com.

Space has been left for the minutes of that evening in which it was intended to make a memorandum of the services with a reference to the papers on file, which from their length it was thought unnecessary to copy. The invoices having by direction of the Committee been copied into their B.A.S. All the information in relation to that Expedition either on Record or on file and the proceedings of the Com. are now so complete as to furnish no cause for further complaint.

For the mutual advantage of the Society: & of the parent Board, as well as to economise the funds of both Societies, they entered into a conditional agreement for the charter of a fine ship, on very moderate terms; but owing to advice from the A. S. stating that their proposed Empt^{rs} would not be ready at the appointed time, it ~~was~~ was found unwise to consummate the contract. The painful receipt of the Intelligence on the 4th (Wed^r) of the massacre of Bassa Leone rendering it imprudent to send more Emigrants to our own Colony than those who might be on their way to this port or Norfolk, we chartered for the sum of \$1500, the Brig Independence, as of Charter party accompanying, to take a cargo, together with such Empt^{rs} as we might have to Liberia; touching as occasion might render most desirable at Monrovia, Bassa Leone or both ports, owing to various and vexatious delays on the part of the owners she did not finally sail until the 23^d Nov^r with The Buchanan our agent, Ino Williams alias Whiteah, a native African who has been at school in this City, with Jonas Humphreys, wife & two children as passengers. Their pervasination was however the less to be regretted, as severe gales of long continued headwinds prevented the vessel by which our tobacco, molasses & other articles of cargo, together with the boats & munitions granted

by the Navy Dept were freighted, from arriving until far beyond the period first assigned for sailing. Favourable as are the terms on which even now the vessel stands us, they would have been far more so, had not the owners, after the agreement was signed & part of the cargo actually on board refused to proceed unless paid, contrary to the original terms, one half the Expenses of landing the cargo & subsequently, owing to want of proper stowing, prevented much of the lumber bought from being sent.

Great pains were taken to provide every article deemed needful for the comfort & supply of our people, & at the same time to pursue the most rigid economy in the disbursements & quantities of the various articles needed: & it is gratifying to believe from subsequent facts, that the cargo amounting with freight, insurance & other charges to Drs 10,962¹/₂ was bought at the most favourable juncture, & on terms which could not in any case have been more advantageous, many of them having been generously sold at cost, & in some instances given to us.

Alas! this whole amount is yet unpaid owing to Drift from the Colony amounting to Drs 20,53⁵/₈ having absorbed all our funds: - & as many of the goods were at cash prices, & various acceptances rapidly falling due for the bal: we very respectfully & earnestly suggest the propriety of the Exec: Com: urging upon the board, the imperative necessity of taking early & efficient steps for liquidating this heavy amount & more especially as the town meeting held with a view to raise funds in aid of the cause, has so far fallen very short of relieving our Treasury

Gentlemen

I reached Pittsb^g after 62 hours travel in extremely cold weather, on Thursday evening, and was confined to my room with head ache till Saturday morning. In that town & Alleghany I preached three sabbaths on Colonization in 6 churches. The Com^d of the Pittsb^g Society met on Monday P.M. & though urged strongly to an earlier meeting concluded that public meeting could not be held till Tuesday Ev^g after the 3^d sabbath. The meeting was regularly & fully announced for that Ev^g but unfortunately when we went to the church the Sexton had provided neither fire nor lights & they could not be purchased procured & it was necessarily put off until the following Monday when we had a full meeting in a rainy evening. In company with Stephen Culwell Esq^r whose zeal in the cause is above all praise, I devoted my time to soliciting subscriptions we procured eight \$100 subscriptions (one of them \$100 a year for five years) & from or five gentlemen were out of town, out of whom Mr Caldwell expected to procure at least two more \$100 subscriptions Three \$50. Subscriptions were signed and a number of smaller promised. The Com^d were to meet the day ~~was~~ I left & to appoint collectors & district the town for smaller subscriptions about \$135 were collected at the public meeting the Rev Dr Brown of Cannonsburg gave me \$10 but declined opening the college chapel for preaching. Mr Caldwell paid me \$245. deducting \$1.17/100 discount for a bill on Philad^a that is to say \$243. 83/100 which with Dr Brown's donation made 253^{83/100}; of which sum I have paid \$153. 83/100 to your Treasurer While at Pittsb^g I went to Washington

held a meeting there in a snowy bog Prof Lee told me it was impossible to make collections there except on the 4th July I came to Chambersburg on my return preached in two churches on the sabbath & held a public meeting on Tuesday Ev'g The Society appointed a Com^o. to procure as many new members as possible. With great effort I persuaded two gentlemen Messrs Maderia & Chambers to subscribe ten dollars each & they promised, on the day I left, to solicit several others to give as much & thought they should succeed with favor I went on to Harrisburgh after consultation with Mr Harris & some members of the Legislature I found that in the existing ~~state~~^{excitement} of that body, owing to masonry & the United States Bank Bill there was no prospect of getting their attention to Colonization under three weeks & therefore after staying two days & satisfying myself of this fact returned.

Dr Bell having been allotted at the previous meeting of the Committee, to prepare a report on "the Subject of the Share of the expense of the last Expedition to King Independence to Bussa Cove to be borne by the N. York Society" presented the following which was accepted by the Committee. Report. The Ex. Com. to which was referred, with instructions to report to the Board, "on the Subject of the Share of the expense of the Expedition to Independence Soc: has agreed to record on its minutes the following opinion.

The untold & bloody catastrophe at Bussa Cove gave the survivors the right of a direct appeal, as a matter of course, to the two Societies, at Penn^a & N. York, under whose guardianship the infant Colony was.

The expedition fitted out & despatched from Phil^a by the Independence with the express view of relieving the sufferers at Bussa Cove, and of furnishing them with the means of resuming their Settlement there, was a Special one. It was an extraordinary effort made to meet an extraordinary occurrence one not certainly anticipated, nor for which any anterior provision had been agreed upon by the two allied Societies. The necessity & the justice of giving prompt & efficient relief in the emergency was of course felt & acknowledged at once by both Societies. Neither could in a moment intend to throw the whole burden of responsibility and

expense on the one which should first step forward
I began the measures so loudly & imperatively called
for. The Penn^a Society was the first to meet &
attempt to vanquish the alarming obstacles
interposed in the way of colonization. It assumes
no merit in this stand & since it was taken
the requisite which sent out to Africa with a
full confidence in the zealous support & co-opera-
tion of its ally in N. York. The supplies were
various & abundant, but not more than were
deemed necessary to make up the losses incurred
by the attack on & forced removal of the Colonists
to their restoration to their primary location.

The N. York Society, by their Secretary, agreed
to bear its proportion of the expenses incurred by
the calamity; but now thinks the supplies sent
out were beyond the wants of the case. This is
a point which time will determine. It must
the data are imperfect, but if to the items known
to & admitted by the N. York Society & for which
it agrees to pay, be added the drafts, the cost of
the return of the Colonists & the loss of stores sent
by the *Nines* & *Indiana* the sum total will
it is believed fall little short, if any, of the whole
expended in the expedition by the Independence.
In adopting the view taken by the N. York
Society, as the basis of a final arrangement,
the Board of Managers of the N. Men's Colonization
may reasonably ask of the Society to carry
out its intentions by the payment of the amount
allowed by Dr. Prindlett together with ~~that~~
the amount of the drafts hereinafter mentioned
& the balance when all the accounts of expenses

The hitherto depressed fortunes of this Race

Six years ago Mr Cresson took a leading & effective part, first in the original suggestion & afterward in devising & carrying out the measures for founding a new colony in Liberia at Bassa Cove under the auspices & control of the Young Men's Col. Soc. of Penna., & the N.Y. City Colonization Society. He was also foremost in giving pecuniary aid for the restoration of the new settlements which had for a season suffered under adverse circumstances.

The union of the Young Men's Society with the Penna. Soc. in each of which he was a manager was followed by the same devotion to the cause as before. Nor has he restricted himself within arbitrary sectional limits. He has given his services for a lengthened period, both in the N. England & in the Slave holding States to the A. Col. Society & in both those portions of the U.S. he has manifested his usual ability in increasing its funds & in extending its influence. Already through the exertions of Mr Cresson during a visit some years ago in Great Britain, has the stream of benevolence from some of the friends of Africa in that Country been directed toward Liberia, of which the settlement of Beulah furnishes pleasing testimony.

The E. Com. without however recommending him to engage in any systematic or toilsome efforts in the cause of Colonization

during his future stay in England, including
the hope that opportunities compatible with
his health & personal comfort will not be
wanting for him to unite in brotherly action.
The friends of the cause in that country &
in the U. States, with these views & in order
as much as possible to save Mr Cresson
the trouble of repeated & protracted explanations,
verbal & written of the state & prospects of
Colonization & the Statistics & Resources of
Liberia the Ex. Com. Request the Genl. Agent
