The Annual Report of the Treasurer was read and put upon file. It showed a balance of \$700.54. on hand, Oct. 6. 1877; and Investments amounting to \$17,100., and certain inactive assets, including a claim of \$9,442.96 against Jay Cooke & Co.

The Treasurer, Mr. P. C. Hollis, tendered his resignation of the office held by him, and the consideration of this resignation was postponed.

The Report on the accounts of the former Corresponding Secretary, Mr. Rev. Thos. S. Malcolm, adopted by the Board, was as follows:—

The Committee to whom it was referred to examine the accounts of Rev. Thomas S. Malcolm, late Corresponding Secretary and Assistant Treasurer, respectfully report—

That after a careful examination of the various items in the account referred to with the accompanying schedules A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H & I, it is considered only to be necessary to report upon each item of his charges or claims against the Society, consecutively, in the order that they are set forth in his account.

Item 1.—Mr. Malcolm charges the Society with Order No. 465, for \$221.25. This is disallowed because by the Resolution of the Board passed May 8, 1866, by unanimous consent, Mr. Malcolm being present and voting for it, this order was made payable exclusively out of funds which either had been or were

to be specially collected by the Secretary for the expenses of the emigrants from Barbadoes, and not from the general funds of the Society.

Item 2. Order No. 624 for \$250 is allowed.

These commissions are claimed by virtue of the action which was taken by this Board on the Report of a Committee made April 10. 1866, which is found in Schedule G, accompanying Mr. Malcolm's account.

"On the 8<sup>th</sup> day of May a special Committee reported to the Board among other things as follows:

The Committee find a large number of contributions acknowledged upon the Treasurer's books as having been received within the last four years, upon which Mr. Malcolm asks no per centage, as they were obtained in some cases only partially, and in others not at all through his personal efforts.

xxxxx, The Committee also recommend that the Society take such order as shall hereafter require all accounts of the Corresponding Secretary and per centages

due to him to be settled once a month. The Report of the Committee was unanimously adopted" the Corresponding Secretary being present and consenting thereto.

No collections whatever having been reported after this date, on Nov. 12<sup>th</sup> 1867, the Board passed the following Resolution:

"On motion, it was voted that the Assistant Treasurer settle with the Treasurer, in full, upon the first Monday of every month."

These Resolutions of the Board have never been complied with on the part of Mr. Malcolm, and the claim is therefore wholly disallowed.

Item 5. The next charge is for services from Oct. 1871 to Oct. 1872, the salary being made equivalent to the net receipts which amount is to \$1000.11. As we are advised the amount named was the amount of gross receipt and the Treasurer's Books show that the following items of expenses should be deducted therefrom:-

Rent for one year	\$ 300.

Leaving the Net Amount to be allowed for salary	<u>371.88</u> <u>\$628.25</u>

Item 6. The next is an item of charges made for collecting funds for purposes other than Colonization, covering support of Priest and others \$100 per annum.

For Priest

\$460.00

This item is disallowed for the same reason which is given for the first item, viz. That it cannot in any way be a charge upon the general funds of the Society.

Item 7. The next item of the account charges the society-

1<sup>st</sup> with his salary at \$600 per annum from Oct. 1872 under the resolution of Sept. 24. 1872, which is allowed. and

2<sup>nd</sup> with 33 $\frac{1}{3}$  % of the surplus of collections over \$600 per annum.

A statement of collections made from Oct 10. 1872, to Nov. 6. 1877 is now for the first time presented by the late Assistant Treasurer. It has been made up by him from copies of his correspondence which he kept for the Society. He has not kept any account of them whatever, and we have no means of knowing whether it is or is not a full and complete list of all the collections which have been made by him for the Society during this time. Assuming however that it is fully and correctly given, you Committee report the same as allowed.

3<sup>d</sup> A third claim is made under this head for expenses at the office paid by him to the aggregate amount of \$468.

For this item not a single voucher has been produced. Mr. Malcolm says this is his estimate, and it is not one half as much as the expenses which were incurred by Mr. Coppinger who preceded Mr. Malcolm ~~as~~ the office of Secretary; but it must be remembered that during the time that Mr. Coppinger acted as our Secretary the business of the Society was conducted with marked precision and exactness. The meetings of the Board were regularly held, and each Committee was duly called upon to take action and report upon the business of the Society which was committed to its hands.

Your Committee believe that some allowance ought to be made to the Secretary on this account, and have accordingly fixed the sum at three hundred dollars.

It appears by Mr. Malcolm's account that after allowing all the credits which he admits should be given to the Society there remains a balance due him of \$1575.25.

The total amount of his charges is \$7184.58.

### The History of Brownsville, Liberia.

The African Repository for Dec 1869, contains a list of Emigrants, giving their name, age, occupation, education & religious connection, sent in the ship Golconda from Hampton Roads, Nov. 11, 1869 to found a settlement on the St. Paul's river, to be called, Brownsville. In an editorial in the same number page 374 it is stated:-

The people "from Pennsylvania & from Harrison N.B. 68 persons have been designated

the Brown company & are to found a new community on the St. Paul's river to be known as Brownsville, at the suggestion & in compliance with the wishes of the Board of Managers of the Pennsylvania Col. Soc., who have appropriated the sum of five thousand dollars out of a legacy made them by Charles Brown Esq., late of Pittsburgh Penna. an old Vice President & frequent benefactor of that & this society.

The 53d Annual Rep't of the American Col. Soc. presented Jan 18, 1870 p 9. under head of "The Bolivian Expedition" says:

"The people from Penna & 44 from Jamisonville N.C. were called the Brown company, & are to found a settlement on the St. Paul's river to be known as Brownsville, in compliance with the suggestion & expressed wishes of the Board of Managers of the Penna. Col. Soc., who have made an appropriation of five thousand, eight hundred dollars toward the expenses of their passage & acclimation from the legacy of Charles Brown Esq., late of Pittsburgh Penna, an esteemed Vice President & frequent benefactor of that & this society".

The fifty-fourth annual Report of the Am. Col. Soc. presented Jan 17, 1871 p 15. remarks: - "The Company from Jamisonville N.C. chose to locate Brownsville about three miles below Virginia & two miles

back from the St. Paul's river or  
ten miles from Monrovia.

The sixty-first Annual Report of  
the Am. Col. Soc. presented Jan. 15, 1878 says:

"We gratefully acknowledge the  
receipt of some six hundred dollars  
from the Sierra Colonization Society  
toward defraying the expense of  
the present Company for Brunoville —  
a settlement on the St. Paul's river,  
commenced in 1870, at the suggestion  
& with the aid of that active and  
devout, which latter has been con-  
tinued by appropriations reaching  
nearly eleven thousand dollars."

The sum of the published receipts of  
the Am. Col. Soc. in the African Repor-  
ting for February 1870 p. 64 is the  
following: "Philadelphia. Philadephia  
Pa. Col. Soc. by Rev. Thos. Malcolm, Cor.  
Sec & Ass't. Pres. for the passage to  
& a certain amount in Liberia of the Brun-  
oville Company of fifty eight emi-  
grants by ship Golconda November  
1869. \$568.00".

And in the African Reporting  
for February 1871 p. 64 as follows:—  
Philadelphia, Phila. Pa. Col. Soc. by  
Rev. Thos. T. Malcolm Cor. Sec & Ass't. Pres.  
for the passage & maintenance of  
the emigrants by ship Golconda,

Nov. 1870 for Brownsville, Liberia \$2700  
(Sundays mentioned has been made  
of forty dollars received by the Am. Col. Soc.  
from the Pa. Col. Soc.)

The African Repository for Oct 1873  
pp. 318 + 319 contains an account of a  
visit by the Rev. Edward St. Blyden D.D.  
to Brownsville, as follows:-

There are in Brownsville thirty houses,  
about twenty five comfortable thatched  
buildings & fair log : one day school,  
supported by the Am. Col. Soc having  
thirty scholars in regular attendance:  
one thatched building where the Bapt-  
ists, worship. Every lot was under  
cultivation. I saw flourishing coffee  
trees & beautiful patches of tobacco,  
potatoes & cassava etc. I was on the whole  
well pleased with the energy & thrift  
of the people of this settlement. The swamps  
near this town are all filled up suf-  
ficiently to make permanent roads &  
substantial bridges : all done by them-  
selves without help.

Rev. John B. Quincy who spent the  
winter of 1876-77. in Liberia lately  
expressed to me his high gratification  
at the flourishing condition of Brownsville  
stating that he saw there a comfortable  
Presbyterian church, which he under-  
stood had been erected at the sole

expenses of the residents of the settlement - are evidence of liberality, perhaps not to be found elsewhere in Labrador."

## COLONIZATION.

MAKING A HOME FOR THE COLORED MAN IN AFRICA.

Public Meeting Last Night of the American Colonization Society — Addresses Showing the Work Which Has Been Accomplished.

In January last a meeting of the American Colonization Society was held at Washington, when it was decided that a public meeting in connection with the Pennsylvania auxiliary should be held in Philadelphia. The result of this action was a well attended meeting last evening in Association Hall. Among those who occupied seats upon the stage were Hon. John H. B. Latrobe, of Baltimore, president of the American Colonization Society; Hon. Eli K. Price, president of the Pennsylvania Society; Rev. Noah Hunt Schenck, D. D., of Brooklyn; Rev. D. C. Haynes, of Boston; Rev. Henry W. Warren, D. D.; Rev. George Dana Boardman, D. D.; Rev. George Currie, D. D.; Rev. W. P. Breed, D. D.; Rev. W. H. Phillips; Rev. Dr. Miller, of Mount Holly, N. J., and Reginald Fendall, of Washington.

Shortly after eight o'clock the meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. Dr. Breed. Hon. Eli K. Price then nominated Hon. John H. B. Latrobe as chairman. Upon taking the chair he delivered an address, in which he gave the origin of the society and the work which it had begun for colonization in Africa. The first efforts to work out the plan of the society were depicted and the settlement which began and which marks the Republic of Liberia, Religious and civil, in its great work to establish in this dark country in 1822, a colony of fifty-one colonists first arrived in 1822, with Ashman, who had intended to return home, but he remained, as he soon found he was required to do.

It was a question of battle or extermination. The Presbyterian clergyman became a military leader. Some of his small force was stricken with fever, and Ashman also soon died. On November 14, 1822, there was a concentrated attack, and danger was imminent, but, by a determined effort, the settlement was saved. Again there was another attack, but the settlers were prepared for the first and last that threatened the colony. A treaty of peace was entered into, and it was observed. Every year the colony was increased by fresh arrivals, the town was built up, Mr. Ashman and Mr. Johnson then arranged a plan of government, which was the beginning of the reign of law and order in the Republic.

At this date the slave trade existed almost under the guns of the colony. Mr. Ashman now assumed the offensive in aid of humanity. In a brig, with fifty-four men, he proceeded to the Spanish factory and freed the slaves and made a strong alliance which resulted in the slave trade in that vicinity. Mr. Ashman returned to this country soon after, only to die. Since 1822 the expectations of the colored people have been realized, and a young republic has been formed with a government ably administered. There is a home in the land of their forefathers for all those colored men who think they have better chances for them than they have in this country. The state of Africa is being sought after now by all nations; but far greater than all this has been the work of this society in that great country. It is the hope of the colored people, however, and it will do for Africa what the pilgrims North and South did for us. When a prosperous people shall have made Africa attractive to the world past of this country, then will the next session be regarded by all men as settled forever.

Rev. Dr. James Saul then submitted the following resolutions, which were unanimously adopted:

*Resolved*. That the American Colonization Society, in the establishment of the free and independent Republic of colored people on the western coast of Africa, which has been recognized as a Christian nation by the United States, Great Britain, France, Prussia and other leading Powers of the world, is entitled to the hearty and aid of the philanthropist and Christian.

*Resolved*. That under the well-ordered Government of the Republic of Liberia political and religious liberty have been secured and preserved to the colored people, whose formerly the cruel and barbarous slave trade prevailed, thus affording a natural and important gateway for the exploration and Christianization of Africa.

*Resolved*. That the disinterested efforts of the American Colonization Society have obtained great results for the benefit of the colored people who availed themselves of its offerings, and that the opportunity to accomplish ever-glorious achievements for the race should be improved by enlarged liberality.

Mr. Henry W. Warren, D. D., was the next speaker, and said those present were gathered together in the interest of the founding of a nation. Immigration and emigration are what God has given us, and we have no alternative for a nation lost in pleasure unless a new element is brought into it and changes the whole plan of operation. God has put in man a spirit of research. He was created with a desire for new homes can be found and better times follow. All the great nations of ages have come from these emigrations, and all the continents have been peopled with men who have come from the other. And now comes Africa, and what God has designed for the future of this great country is hard to tell. It is the task of every one of us to do our best to do our duty. There must be the inspiration of new ideas, and power must come to them from abroad. We must give the new country our ideas.

The next address was by Rev. Noah Hunt Schenck, D. D., of Brooklyn, who said that the society had been in existence but thirty years, when it founded a government in a distant country, which is unparalleled in history. The work of the society is in the interest of the African by the Anglo-Saxons, who tore him years ago from his home. The society had obtained great success in the South, and even from Southern slaveholders. He did not believe there was to-day a slaveholder in the South who would welcome back the old institution of slavery. The question is, What the negro requires to make him contented? Will he stand or will he cast his lot in Africa among his peers? He did not believe the colored man was averse to emigrating to Africa, but there were many of our Northern friends and others, the Northern Abolitionist and the Southern planter, who are opposed to his leaving. Times, he thought, were propitious for colonization, and Africa is the continent of opportunity. After the speech of Dr. Boardman, D. D., followed a brief address. He did not think he would dissuade the colored people from making their exodus to the Northwest, but he would persuade them to make a shorter journey across the Atlantic to that country of their own, the future of which we know not.

Addresses were also made by ex-Governor James Pollock and Rev. D. C. Haynes, agent of the school in the North. After which the meeting adjourned with the benediction by Rev. Dr. Saul.

In any State by combinations too powerful to be suppressed by the ordinary course of judicial proceedings or by the powers vested in marshals by this act, the same being notified to the President of the United States by an Agent of the Board of Audit, it shall be lawful for the President of the United States to call forth the militia of such State to suppress such combinations and to cause the laws to be duly executed. And if the laws of such State or other combinations may happen to call for the military for the purpose of suppressing such insurrection, or of causing laws to be duly executed, it shall be lawful for him to call into the service the land and naval forces of the United States, as may be necessary, until the laws are duly executed after the commencement of the ensuing session."

In 1795 this provision was substantially enacted in a law which repealed the acts of 1792, 1793 and 1795, and was approved by the approval of President Jefferson.

"That in all cases of insurrection or rebellion to the laws, either of the United States, or of any individual State or Territory, where the laws shall be obstructed, or where the public safety may demand it, to call for the military for the purpose of suppressing such insurrection, or of causing laws to be duly executed, it shall be lawful for him to call into the service the land and naval forces of the United States, as shall be judged necessary, having first served all the prerequisites of the law in respect."

In this act it will be seen that the section of the law of 1795 was extended so as to authorize the National Government to not only the militia, but the army and navy of the United States, calling them into full service. The important provision of the acts of 1792, 1795 and 1807 modified its terms from time to time to adapt it to existing emergency, remained in force until 1861. In 1861, President Lincoln, on July 23, 1861, it was re-enacted substantially in the same language in which it now stands in the Revised Statutes, viz.:

"Section 6268. Whensoever by reason of a lawless combination, combination or assemblies of persons, or rebellion against authority of the Government of the United States, it shall become impracticable, in the judgment of the President, to sustain the laws of the United States, or to suppress such combination, combination or rebellion by the ordinary course of judicial proceedings, laws of the United States within any State or Territory, it shall be lawful for the President to call forth the militia of any or all the States to execute the laws, or to call into the service the land and naval forces of the United States as he may deem necessary to enforce the faithful execution of the laws of the United States, or to suppress such combination, combination or rebellion. That if thereof the laws of the United States may be forcibly opposed, or the execution thereof obstructed, or the execution thereof obstructed. This ancient and fundamental law has been in force from the foundation of the government."

To this principle of Experience.

It is now proposed to abrogate it on certain days and at certain places. In my judgment no fact has been produced which tends to show that it ought to be repealed, or suspended for a single hour at any place in any of the States. At the time of the adoption of the Constitution, the principle of experience in the course of our history is in favor of sustaining its efficiency unimpaired. On every occasion when the supremacy of the Constitution has been called in question, the perpetuity of our institutions imperially principles of this statute, enacted by the fathers, has enabled the Government of the United States to maintain its authority and to preserve the integrity of the Union. In the most critical periods of our history my predecessors in the Executive office have relied on this great principle. It was on this principle that President Washington called out the militia to repel the rebellion in Penna., even in 1774. In 1804, on the same principle, President Jefferson broke up the Burr conspiracy by issuing orders for the employment of such force, either of the regular army or of the militia, as may be directed by the civil authorities, \* \* \* as might enable them to suppress effectively the further progress of the enterprise.

And it is on the same authority that President Jackson crushed nullification in South Carolina, and that President Lincoln issued his call for troops to save the Union in 1861. On numerous other occasions of less importance, under similar circumstances, and certainly under the present, this power has been usefully exerted to enforce the laws without objection by any party in the country, and without attracting general attention. The great elementary constitutional principle which was the foundation of the original statute of 1792, and which has been in essence in the various forms it has assumed since its first adoption, is that the Government of the United States possesses under the Constitution, in full measure, the power of self-protection in its own agencies, altogether independent of State authority. It need be against the hostility of State governments. It should remain embodied in our statutes unimpaired, as it has been from the very origin of the government. It should be regarded as hardly less valuable a lesson than a pro-vision of the Constitution itself.

There are many other important statutes containing provisions that are liable to be used to sustain the same principle, such as holding elections if the bill before me should become a law. I do not undertake to furnish a list of them. Many of them, perhaps the most of them, have been drawn in the details on the measure. They relate to extradition, to crimes against the Election laws, to quarantine regulations, to neutrality, to Indian reservations, to the civil rights of citizens and to the like. I might say more, but it may be safely said that the meaning and effect of this bill is to take from the General Government an important part of its power to enforce the laws.

State Rights.

Another grave objection to the bill is its discrimination in favor of the State and against the national authority. The presence or employment of the army or navy of the United States is often necessary in the course of events at the place where an election is being held in a State to uphold the authority of a State Government then and there in need of such military intervention to sustain an unlawful usurpation the authority of the Government of the United States then and there in need of such military intervention. Under this bill the presence and employment of the army or navy of the United States would be lawful and might be necessary to maintain the constitution. Such a section against the domestic violence that would overthrow it, but would be unlawful to maintain the conduct of a national election against the authority of the Government overboard.

This discrimination has never been attempted in any previous legislation by Congress, and it is no more compatible with sound principles of the Constitution, or the necessary

Esq., long an enlightened friend of the colored race. For this purpose, the Board of Managers of the Pennsylvania Colonization Society generously appropriated \$7000 from the residuary bequest of Mr. Brewer, to that old and zealous auxiliary. Emigration to Liberia every year under the auspices of the Society, has been uninterrupted for the past fifty-eight years. Those now reported, make the number colonized since the war to be 3291, and a total from the beginning of 15,289, exclusive of 5722 recaptured Africans, which we induced and enabled the Government of the United States to settle in Liberia, making a grand total of 21,001 persons to whom the Society has given homes in Africa.—*Annual Report, 1879.*

APPLICATIONS.—Largely increased numbers of the intelligent and enterprising portion of the colored population are contemplating emigration to Liberia. The demand upon the Colonization Society for the means of settlement, far exceeds anything of the kind in its history. It is estimated that half a million of people are considering removal to Africa as their home and nationality. Exodus Associations are reported at Pineville, Florida, with 800 members; at Houston, Texas, with 300, and at Helena Arkansas, with 500 members, proposing to charter and fit out vessels and proceed their own expense, direct to Liberia.—*Annual Report, 1879.*

AN EXODUS.—Since our last Anniversary, there has been witnessed the first effective movement by American people of color, from their own original, voluntary act, and at their own cost, to remove to the land of their ancestors. March 21st, the bark Azor was dedicated to its especial mission at Charleston, S. C., with religious services, and April 21st, she sailed from that city with 274 passengers for Monrovia. About as many more, eager to go, were left for want of room. Two church organizations were formed among them before embarkation, viz., the Azor African Methodist Episcopal Church, and the Shiloh Baptist Church.

The "labor of our country" seems to be the chief barrier in the way of the most ardent philanthropists, paralyzing their efforts to promote the magnificent work of Colonization on the continent of Africa by efficient workers, providentially prepared

Gentlemen:

The Rev. Dr. Saul has informed me of the action taken at the last meeting of the Dennis Col. Soc'y., of which meeting no notice reached me, and I was not present. Not being willing to become in any way responsible for that action, I owe it to you and to myself to state my objection to it.

I. You have contracted to pay to a collecting agent \$1500 for six months' services, without condition as to the amount he may collect. According to our experience for many years past it appears not likely that he would collect that amount, and that he would have to be paid from the our treasury, and

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all the money there is held on the trust of the will of Mr. Brewer, which I have always understood to be to send immigrants to Liberia and to accimatize them. Of this fund we are trustees for that purpose, and have no more right to divert it than any other trustees.

II As far as the agents collections would go, they would be taken by him out of his receipts before or after being paid to our Treasurer, and if they amounted to but \$1200 or less, the agent would take all; yet he had asked the money to send immigrants to Liberia, and it would have been paid for that purpose only. That we could not justify ourselves in doing; that the agent could not explain to those whom he addressed and expect to get their money; and if he could not explain that to them, he would receive it in the consciousness that he was inducing them to give what they would not give if the whole matter were explained. This our agent would not do if he clearly understood the position, and this I think the managers of the Diana, Col. Soerg. will not do if they get a clear apprehension of the subject. And

I should not think the principle would be altered if a considerable percentage were paid out of the Collections, as it would not bear explanation to the donors, nor could we stand the imputation of treating them in a way that we should not like to be treated.

I find I am not in accord with the Managers of the Society, and now hereby both resign the office of the Society President and my membership in the Society.

## Pennsylvania Colonization Society.

Annual Report for the year ending Oct 10<sup>th</sup> 1881.

The President and Board of Managers of the Pennsylvania Colonization Society: —

Sixty-five years ago, the American Colonization Society at Washington, was established in the Capital of the United States under the leadership of statesmen of the highest character, influenced by the most pure and patriotic motives. The Hon. Justice Bushrod Washington, of the Supreme Court of the United States, being its first President. Notwithstanding, it had to encounter ignorance, prejudice, and misconception of the motives of its members. — There was laid the foundation of the free Republic of Liberia, on the West Coast of Africa, composed of citizens of African descent, with a Constitution modeled after that of the United States. It is remarkable for its rapid growth, and for the intelligence and purity of character of its officers of government.

In the year 1830, the Pennsylvania Colonization Society was incorporated under the laws of this State, as an auxiliary of the Society at Washington.

Started by a few philanthropic citizens of this Commonwealth, and by a bequest of Charles Bruce Esq of Pittsburg, which has been very judiciously managed

by the Executors, the Society<sup>2</sup> has been enabled to render material aid to the parent society. During the past year two thousand dollars (\$2000) have been contributed to the funds of the Washington Society, and the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300) also paid to Edward S Morris Esq, for two teachers sent to Liberia.

The <sup>4</sup> treasures of this and of the parent Society are now so reduced that efficient means must be resorted to without delay to replenish them, or the great work of aiding the colored people of this Country, who, in great numbers are desirous of immigrating to Liberia, and of aiding in upholding and advancing the work of civilizing and Christianizing the "Dark Continent," will soon be brought to a stand so far as these Agencies are concerned.

On June 9th last, the Board received with regret the resignation of J. P. Brinton Esq., the Treasurer of the Society; he having been appointed to an office of trust which rendered necessary his removal from the city. It is presumed that an appointment of his successor will be made at the next meeting.

It is a source of much regret that while every nation of Europe is engaged in energetic and costly efforts to obtain a profitable footing in Africa, & some of them have steamers running regularly to the coasts of this Country, which has lately been designated as the "Dark Continent" and recently, and more properly perhaps, as the "New World" that the Government of the U. States seems to be quite apathetic, or indifferent in regard to reaping the advantages which other nations are sure to obtain through the efforts they are making. By their explorations, it is now ascertained that Africa is an immense continent in which are found navigable rivers, fertile soils and mineral ores of inestimable value, and in the interior natives much superior to those

The American Col. Society at its annual meeting in 18<sup>—</sup> applied to the Government of the U. States to make a scientific exploration in the interior of Africa from a starting point in Liberia, an appropriation of \$25,000 being asked for to accomplish this object. No action thereon, has ever been taken.

It may be well for persons considering the question of emigration to Liberia, to know that the first expedition was conceived & carried into effect by Paul Duffee, a colored man of Mass. who took out from Boston, forty (40) emigrants in his own vessel, at his own expense, to the English Settlement of Sierra Leone, which adjoins the Republic of Liberia, in 1815. He said he was "moved to do this by a desire to raise his brethren in the U. States to Civil & religious liberty in the land of their fore-fathers."

This preceded the founding of the Colony of the Republic of Liberia.

The cause of the people of Color who desire to immigrate to the Republic of Liberia is one that should commend itself to philanthropists and Christians, to their prayers & substantial aid to enable them to return to the land of their fore-fathers, from which they were ruthlessly torn to cultivate the Soil, develop the resources and augment the wealth of these United States of America our own favored land.

DEAR SIR:

Your attention is respectfully invited to the reasons why it is incumbent on us to continue, for some time longer, that fostering care over the Republic of Liberia, which has been exercised by this country and Government since the days of President Monroe.

1. Liberia is America's tribute of restitution to Africa; the first and only Colony ever planted by the people of these United States, outside of their own territory. It ought surely to be adequately supported.

2. Liberia, for the last thirty-five years, has sustained itself, as an independent Republic, in spite of enormous difficulties, and much opposition. We cannot be indifferent to such efforts, or refuse our sympathy and aid where they are so much needed.

3. The best form in which to render effective aid, is to assist in strengthening Liberia, by sending there good, well-selected emigrants. This the Colonization Society undertakes to do; and it is for this object your contributions are solicited.

Knowing that this subject has been in a kind of abeyance for some time past, the Board of Managers of the Pennsylvania Auxiliary Society have directed me, as their Secretary, to present afresh the claims which this subject has upon all who are concerned in the Christianization and civilization of Africa, especially

that portion nearest to us, the Western Coast, from which so many thousands were brought away, enslaved. To these same shores it is fitting that we should send back some of their descendants—enlightened and evangelized.

The Colonization Society only ~~purposes~~, <sup>for</sup> the present, to transfer about three hundred each year; but they would regret the necessity of doing less than this, especially now, at the time when some 50,000 applicants are begging to go to the land of their fathers, and entreating our Society to help them on their way.

How worthy our object is, and how well adapted to its accomplishment are the means employed, may be gathered from the well-considered and reliable testimony contained in the subjoined letters, which are given in the order of their respective dates:

**From RT. REV. BISHOP STEVENS.**

*Nov 3*

*Philadelphia, March 21st, 1881.*

**REV. AND DEAR BROTHER:**

It is the opinion of wise and active men, that the spiritual and social regeneration of Africa, can, under God, be best secured by the efforts of her own sons. We, in the United States, remembering what a source of material wealth has been derived from the enforced labor of Africans, on our own soil, ought to feel that a great obligation rests upon us, to raise and enlighten that class, whether here, or in their original home. To secure this object, the American Colonization Society, and its branch in this State, are making strenuous efforts; efforts moving in two parallel lines of Evangelization and Colonization, which together will carry inestimable benefits to that "Dark Continent."

Most heartily therefore, I commend to you the Rev. Edw. W. Syle, D.D., and the work which he represents, and ask for him your kind consideration.

The decease of W<sup>m</sup> H. Allen, LL.D. one of the Vice Presidents of this Society having been announced, the following tribute to his memory, was presented by Hon. Eli R. Price, & ordered to be entered on the minutes & copies transmitted to the Parent Society at Washington, & to the bereaved family.

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Our summer's vacation has brought to us an occasion of mourning. It has pleased Divine Providence to take from us one of our Vice Presidents, William Henry Allen, A.M.D. In this bereavement our Society has lost a long tried friend and earnest advocate; and this <sup>and administrative</sup> community and the whole Country, an eminent teacher and good citizen.

D<sup>r</sup>. Allen died August 29, 1882, aged seventy four years. He had been professor of Mathematics in Dickinson College; whence he was called to take <sup>the</sup> Presidency of G<sup>r</sup>orard College nearly a quarter of a century since. He has held that office of delicate trust, with great acceptance to the Trustees ~~of the~~ and the public; and with entire fidelity to the Will of the Founder, and the religion of our People. He was a layman, but a sincere professor in the Methodist Episcop<sup>al</sup> Church, and in the Christianity professed by that church he lived and died.

On various occasions D<sup>r</sup>. Allen wrote, spoke and published, in advocacy of the purposes of Colonization in the Republic of Liberia. Two purposes were prominent in his mind as in ours: That men of color might <sup>have</sup> a country and nation where their independence should be complete, and no man could look upon them through the discoloring medium of prejudice; That there should be held securely forever a missionary ground, where Christianity and civilization should be planted, thence to spread through the Continent of Africa; Objects worthy the attention and aid of our nation, until our wrong shall be atoned, and be recompensed by blessings an hundredfold.

When the eminently useful good man dies the community in which he lived feel shorn of a great protec-  
=tor, and virtue herself <sup>is felt</sup> to have lost a friend, that seems  
to weaken her hold on mankind. So now we feel in the pres-  
=ence of this great loss; feel that we can but resolve in our  
smaller sphere, to cherish his sweet memory, and try  
to imitate his <sup>great</sup> virtues.

Let us read and re-read the utterances of his great heart of humanity, as they fell from his lips in an Address to the Society, on the 25th. day of October 1863, when this nation was in arms to put down the great rebellion, the fruits of ~~slavery~~<sup>captures</sup> of men and women torn from their homes in Africa. Truly, as he said, if prophet had foreseen, more than two hundred years before, the sequences, as we have read in history, and seen with our own eyes, of crime, sufferings and woes of the American slavery of Africans, "men's faces would have paled at the ghastly spectacle, and not one foot of a slave would have been permitted to touch the shore." Then should we not have seen, as ~~then~~<sup>in 1863</sup> we were daily hearing and seeing, "of a landed aristocracy hostile to republican freedom; the estrangement of kindred communities; the retrograde movement to an aggressive and ferocious barbarism, in which brute force usurps the throne of reason, and thirst for domination makes and breaks the law; the passionate debate which degenerates into frenzied vituperation; and at last the marshalling of mighty armies, the shock and carnage of battle, the destruction of accumulated wealth, the wail of widows and orphans, and the threatened overthrow of a beneficent Government."

He further left us this testimony! "I believe that the Almighty Sovereign of All, the Creator of All, inspired our forefathers to establish this Society to aid in elevating the colored race to a position of freedom and equality, and to plant the Colony, now the Republic of Liberia, which in the fulness of time is to serve as a beacon to the tribes and nations of Africa, and to introduce the principles of our holy religion amongst these savage people."

Thus spake this good philanthropist, "who though dead, he yet speaketh."

#### Annual Report.

The primary object of this Society being to send suitable Col? Emigrants from this country to Liberia, the Board beg leave to mention, as the first item of their Report, that on the 1<sup>st</sup> of December last the Bark "Monrovia" cleared from New York, with Thirty eight (38) emigrants for Brewerville, Liberia.

Of this number our Auxiliary may claim to have provided for about twenty-five (25) by virtue of our Contribution of \$2000 for that purpose.

It has been usual to dispatch a company of emigrants in May as well as in December, but this year, there was a failure to accomplish this owing to delay & uncertainty as to the departure of the sailing vessel.

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usually relied on.

This brings into notice the subject of direct Steam-ship communication between this country & the West Coast of Africa, & it is with much regret the Board have to report that although they have made strenuous efforts to enlist the sympathy & co-operation of mercantile parties, no immediate prospect appears of accomplishing this much desired object. There is something perplexing & hard to be understood in the fact that, while France & England can maintain about thirty (30) steamers, trading regularly on the West African Coast, the U. States does not provide a single one for this service.

Movements, however, have been made both in New York & New Orleans towards the formation of Companies, having for their object the establishment of direct-mail communication between a port in the U. States & a port in Liberia.

At the present time, however, there does not seem to be any probability that Congress will supplement what commerce alone does not venture upon. No African Steam-ship subsidy is to be looked for; neither does there appear to be any disposition to patronize an Exploring Expedition which might penetrate the interior lying eastward of Liberia, & thus open the way for a rail-road that would facilitate direct-communication

between the valley of the upper Niger & the Coast, thus developing the marvelous physical resources of that region where gold, iron & coal are known to exist.

The same apathy exhibited by Congress seems to prevail among the community, so much so that the Agency which our corresponding Secretary has endeavored to exercise in this state, under appointment of the Parent Society in Washington, has not resulted in such an increase of interest or of contribution as was hoped for.

The reasons given, for declining to contribute to the funds of our Society are many & various: an enumeration of the most common of them may be useful, perhaps, as putting the members of our Society in possession of the facts of the case, & as exhibiting the present phases of that opposition, both active & passive - with which our work has now to contend.

The Agent informs us that he meets with the following objections.-

- 1 An undisguised antagonism on the part of many who cherish the old time anti-slavery sentiments
- 2 An unwillingness to help send out of the country the valuable labor which is needed in the development of its resources - particularly at the South.
- 3 A similar unwillingness on the part of those

who consider the Col<sup>n</sup>'s vote as an important vote in politics.

- 4 A feeling that the Colonization Society's work is done; that all has been accomplished that it is wise to attempt now that Liberia has been an independent Republic for 35 years.
- 5 That the condition of affairs in Liberia itself is unsatisfactory - the experiment thus far, of a free Negro Republic is not such as to encourage further aid.
- 6 That Liberia had better be united with the British Colony of Sierra Leone.
- 7 That aid to Africa is merely sentimental.

The Board do not undertake to say how cogent or consistent these objections may be: they are only stated here to show the predominant state of feeling which exists at the present time on the subject of African Colonization. It is assumed that these difficulties, & all others that present themselves are to be met by that "patient continuance in well doing" which has characterized the Society's operations from the very first.

As an encouraging specimen of this, we have to mention, with gratitude, two donations of Books, for the use of the Society's schools in Liberia, both by citizens of Phila. - One from Chas. Foster, Esq. of thirty copies of "The Story of the Gospel"; & one from W<sup>m</sup> Buckley, Esq. of three School Libraries.

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The Treasurer account will show the amount of contributions to have been \$512 - which is irrespective of several donations made by parties in this State, & City to the Treasurer of the Washington Soc'y direct.

The Board has also to note a bequest of the late Mrs. Hannah Richardson, estimated at about \$1600 - the actual receipt of which may be expected sometime during the coming year.

This legacy involves a trust for the promotion of the higher education of "moral & intelligent worthy young colored women;" & suggests some very important questions as to whether an education obtained in this country is practically as good an educational preparation for a happy & useful life in Africa as would be a corresponding - even a somewhat inferior - education obtained on the spot, in the midst of the scenes, & with the local surroundings of what is to be the permanent home. Experience, thus far, seems to indicate that African home training is the best for promoting African civilization: & if this is truly the case, then the immense importance of Liberia College, & of some female school of similar character, under Christian direction, is manifest. The Parent Society at its last annual meeting, emphasized this matter by declaring that "they judged it of the utmost importance that female education should receive special attention at-

this time;" adding "A Christian father at the head of a family of children whose mother continues a heathen, is not in a position to exercise the influence now needed in Liberia for the Christianization & Civilization of Africa."

The 64<sup>th</sup> Annual Report of the Parent Socy mentions Mrs. Barbozo, as having a female school at Brewerville, & Miss Scott one at Grand Bassa County.

Our Socy is indebted to the Rev. Bh. Nicholson & to the Rev. Dr. Paddock for discourses delivered in their respective Churches, during the month of February, presenting the claims of African Colonization. As one result of these addresses, & of the exertions of the Com. on Public Meetings contributions to the amount of \$220. were received. These discourses were printed in Phila. papers, & extra copies distributed — one thousand of each. A very large number of the above-mentioned addresses in pamphlet form, together with that of Rev. Dr. Duryea, accompanied by a special circular have been sent by mail to influential parties in the State & City. Also there has been much advertising in the News papers & a good deal of personal canvassing at the counting houses & residences of our fellow citizens.

Our Socy was represented at the 65<sup>th</sup> Annual Meeting of the Parent Socy (held in Washington Jan'y 17<sup>th</sup> of the present year) by four Delegates

who formed part of the Company that waited on President Arthur, in accordance with what has been customary at the commencement of each new administration. They were courteously received, & were assured of the President's favorable interest in their proceedings.

The Board has already recorded its deep sense of the loss we have sustained in the death of one of our Vice Presidents, the late Wm. F. C. Allen, LL.D. President of Girard College: they refer to it again from a desire to repeat the expression of their sympathy with the bereaved relatives; & also to express the hope that as old friends are removed, new ones may be found to fill their places & carry on their work.

CIVILIZING THE AFRICANS.

The Work Performed by the Pennsylvania Colonization Society.

At the last regular meeting of the Board of Managers of the Pennsylvania Colonization Society the following gentlemen were chosen as delegates to the annual meeting of the parent society, which is fixed for the 16th of January, at Washington, viz.: Edward S. Morris, Esq., and Rev. Drs. Saul, Dulles and Syle. Two thousand dollars were voted to meet expenses of emigrants to Liberia sent out November 1 by bark Monrovia. Rev. Dr. Luther and John Wiedersheim, Esq., were elected life members.

Edward S. Morris, Esq., mentioned the fact that school work was going on at the interior settlement of Arthington. By the last report sixty-five boys were under instruction, more than half being native children of the jungle, and many of them sons of petty chiefs.

On the sewing machines sent out the children's clothing was made from material also sent out, the work being performed by native women, who clubbed together for the purpose. Model school desks, sent out from America, make the school rooms neat and attractive.

Mr. Morris sends out several hundred seeds, month by month, of the eucalyptus globulus, the anti-fever tree of Australia, also one hundred seeds of cinchona (obtained fresh from India), and five hundred of mulberry, to prepare for silk worm feeding. If the climate permits, in due time silk culture is to be inaugurated, in which, if the native women engage, they would be in less slavish dependence on the men. "The future population of Africa," said he, "should come from Christian mothers, not from female slaves."

Mr. Morris also stated that a missionary steamer, costing \$10,000, was to be built in Glasgow, sent out in sections to the west coast of Africa and employed in the service of the Mendi Mission.

Rev. Dr. Luther contributed the following information as important in view of the prospect that the extract known as "eucalyptine" will probably become an important article of commerce with Africa:

"Eucalyptine, the essential oil of the eucalyptus tree, has been tried with marked success in antiseptic surgery as a substitute for carbolic acid, being used in the form of spray, as is the carbolic spray, in surgical operations."

"Peroxide of hydrogen, a product of oils of the turpentine class (and also of the eucalyptus), is a very active disinfectant, and as the leaves of the eucalyptus contain in each hundred pounds from three to six pounds of essential oil, we can hardly avoid the conclusion that the oxygen-carrying property of the oil is an important factor in the malaria-destroying power of the germs."

Report of Committee of Seven.

The Com<sup>tee</sup> of Seven appointed at the Annual meeting of the Socy, held Oct. 9<sup>th</sup> 1882, "to confer with a Com<sup>tee</sup> to be nominated by Dr. Tanner, on the subject of the future Colonization of Africa under the Auspices of this Socy" - beg leave to report as follows:-

On the 9<sup>th</sup> of December last all the members of one Com<sup>tee</sup> (namely, Messrs:- Price, Burton, Paddock, Dalle, Luther, Morris & Sibley)

attended at the Socy's Rooms, & were met by Messrs. Tanner, Reeve, Gould, Miller, Schaffer, Anderson, & Ambrose.

Mr. Price presided & it was suggested that he should make a statement as to the present character & objects of the Socy, but he preferred that Dr. Tanner, as claiming to express the views of the Col<sup>d</sup> people of the Country, should first state the views entertained by them on the subject about which we met to confer.

Whereupon Dr. Tanner proposed to consider five points:-

1. The past attitude of the Col<sup>d</sup> Society;
2. The present attitude;
3. Could the Col<sup>d</sup> people concur & co-operate?
4. What changes were necessary to harmony?
5. In what do we mutually agree?

The first topic was passed over as not requiring present discussion. The second occupied all the time of the meeting - nearly two hours.

Dr. Tanner maintained that the Col. Soc. acted on the theory that the races must be kept apart; that the Col<sup>d</sup> man ought to regard Africa, not America, as his country; that he could endure the African climate better than the white man; that there was a great desire among the Col<sup>d</sup> people to make Liberia their home; that the social disqualification of the Col<sup>d</sup>.

man in America was a fixed fact; for all which views, Dr. Tanner & his friends declared that he & his friends emphatically disented.

Mr. Anderson added that it was doubtful if many col<sup>d</sup> people sincerely desired to emigrate to Africa; & Mr. Schaffer remarked that the Soc. ignored all instances of unsuccessful effort made by col<sup>d</sup> men in this country, & made much of all such instances occurring in Africa.

On the other hand it was replied by Mr. Burton, that social inequalities were from other causes than color; & by Mr. Morris, that a col<sup>d</sup> diplomat (Dr. Tolpygov) had been received respectfully in English Society, & at European Courts. Also, when he met the students of Atlanta University, two-thirds of them expressed their desire to go to Liberia.

Dr. Luther remarked that in Africa it was the white man who was made to feel his desability, & insisted upon the deadly effects of the climate there upon Caucasian constitutions.

Dr. Daddach demurred emphatically to the inferences drawn from his recent sermon as indicating unfriendliness to the negro.

Many other points were ~~incidentally~~ touched; but the above were the principal matters involved in the discussion.

The concluding remarks of the President were of the most judicious & conciliatory character - He referred to his own long cherished sympathy with the Col? exec - even antedating the formation of this Soc'y. expressed his entire satisfaction when he saw them prosperous in any place, & under any circumstances, & assured Dr. Tanners & his friends that all connected with the Soc. were actuated by the same kind feeling.

Since this conference, the subject has been repeatedly discussed in the "Christian Recorder," & some diversity of views expressed, especially in a letter from a Mr. Stetson, dated Shungard, & another from Ph. Turner, of the A.M.E. Church - the latter questioning whether Dr. Tanner's Com<sup>ee</sup> was fairly a representative one -

were pleased with the spirit manifested in the meetings of the Soc. & returned with the impression that there is a bright future ahead for Liberia.

In a conversation with Dr. Blyden, who is spoken of as the man who will probably sit in the President's Chair after the next election, the following interesting points were elicited:-

- I Liberia is a country for negroes & Col? citizens, with a dominant Negro government.
- II Liberia is to be moulded & developed according to the idiosyncrasies of the Negro character.
- III Liberia is not to be pressed on by European Capital & enterprise; but by a slower & more natural rate of growth.
- IV. The present debt of Liberia is to be paid off by resources which are adequate & will be available soon. No foreign loan to be contracted in the future.
- V The Boundary question to be settled by accepting the line of the Sologma River, the line running inland at Right angles to the mouth of the Sologma River.
- VI Education to be carried on in Liberia itself, rather than in the U. S. for Liberia.

The two Professors, recently appointed for Liberia College, Revs. T. McCants Stewart & Hugh Brown, D.D., were present & made brief addresses - showing much enthusiasm as to their future field of labor.

On motion of the Com. on Emigration One hundred dollars (\$100) was voted for passage of Ulysses Parcels, a native African Prince, from N. York to Liberia, via London. Ulysses Parcels is to continue his studies in Liberia College.

The Com. on Emigration was requested to carry out the object of the above resolution.

3. That if he (Com. Sch<sup>dt</sup>) had been o-  
bliged to give a decision as umpire,  
he could not have confirmed the Lite-  
raria claim to that territory, for  
lack of any documentary evidence  
of Title.

In answer to the above, Commodore Sch<sup>dt</sup>  
feldt wrote "Correct".

If, as I understand, the English Govt has consented  
to a settlement of the N.W. Boundary of Liberia -  
by defining the Manna River - or Manna  
Rock as the N.W. limit of the Republic - then  
Liberia still retains the "Mafah river which taps  
the very best part of the disputed territory. This river  
within 30 miles of its source dashes into an elevated  
very fertile country - Beyond Manna R. dips  
to Solymah. The land fronting the ocean is low &  
swampy - Much of it salt marsh - back of which is  
inhabited by a low grade of people & for this  
reason in my opinion not very desirable - Setting  
aside the question of title, which is hardly tenable -

The occurrences of the past year have been note-worthy, especially as exhibiting the changes which have affected the work of the Colonization Society.

At the last Annual Meeting of the Washington Society, the North-west Boundary Question was discussed: since that time intelligence has been received of the annexation to the British Colony of Sierra Leone, of so much of the disputed territory as lies west of the Drama River.

Dr Blyden's visit to this country has resulted in the enlistment of Rev Messrs Stewart & Brown - with whom the Board had an interview; & of Miss Jennie Davis whose passage money (£100.) the Society provided; as it did also that of Ulysses Parcells - a Liberia-College Student.

A Legacy of Mrs. Hannah Richardson - value about \$1800. - the interest of which is applicable to the promotion of Female Education, puts it in the Society's power to assist, in some slight degree, that laudable department of effort; as does also a donation of \$100 from Miss Ellen Walm. This lady, with Miss Amelia Ewing, & the Rev. Dr. Schenck have become Life-Members of the Society. No new members have been enrolled, while \$110. have been voluntarily contributed; \* no collections have been made.

A friendly Conference was held on the 9<sup>th</sup> of Dec<sup>r</sup> '82 between a Committee of Seven, appointed by the Board, & Seven representative colored Ministers of this City. The object was to obtain fuller & more correct information as to the views of the colored people of this country on the subject of Emigration to Africa. The immediate result of this ~~smt~~ has been to awaken discussion in the minds of the colored people throughout.

The Report of the Committee on Emigration, after conference with the Rev. D. A. Day of the Muhlenberg Settlement points to some new form of Agency <sup>not yet</sup> at Brewerville or Arthington.

The Report of the Board of Managers  
to the Society was read, & after some  
discussion was referred to a Committee

As so revised, it reads as follows:—

—Report—

"In presenting their customary Report to the 58<sup>th</sup> Annual Meeting of the Society the Bd. of Managers, feel that it is not necessary to occupy time with the details of a routine which has become familiar to us all, & concerning which our chief duty & solicitude is, to see that the trust-funds committed to our care, are faithfully & judiciously administered. This End the Bd. has endeavored to effect, <sup>during</sup> last year, by guarding its appropriations in such manner, as that no emigrants, sent out by our funds, shall be located in districts where they would be exposed to the perils of warfare.

"The number of Emigrants reported is having been assisted by the parent Society is as follows: — Isaled 1 Dec. 83, thirty-one; 15 April '84, thirteen; 1 Oct '84, forty-seven; in all 112 persons, all & joint, toward whose expenses our African contributed \$4,500.; besides which sum \$75 have been paid as a contribution to the salary of Miss Jennie E. Davis, Principal of the Female Department of Liberia College. From this lady, very interesting & valuable letters have been received; & our hope & expectation is that much good may result

from her faithful labors.

"Communications on the condition & prospects of Liberia have been received, relative to the difficulties with which the service has had to contend, yet expressing no infirmity that they will be overcome.

"The controversy with regard to the N.W. boundary of Liberia has been settled, & the line between the Colony & the British Colony of Sierra Leone has been fixed at the Dannah river. By this settlement the territory of Liberia covers a sea-coast of more than 350 miles to be guarded & provided with Ports of Entry.

"The Bd. continues to recognize the importance of providing increased facilities for Education, especially for females, & we wish to present this feature of our Society's operations as the one which may rightly receive an increased attention. & support. Liberia may claim to enjoy peculiar facilities in the disentanglement of woman from the degrading subjection & dependence under which she is held elsewhere in Africa. In Africa, with slaves forever excluded, & the common laws of marriage recognized, she can be raised to her due rank of moral & domestic companionability; but everywhere else in Negrodome (Sierra Leone excepted)

She is practically enslaved; & with an enslaved womanhood & motherhood, how can Africa be anything else than a hopeless dark continent! Egypt, Abyssinia, the Sudan, Zanzibar, Dahomey, Ashantee — all tell the same tale of female degradation & misery; it is only where, as in Liberia, female industries enable them to feed the body, & female education to feed the mind, that true Emancipation can be realized.

"It is hoped that the friend of Africa will contribute to their means present to promote this great work of education, & education of female education in Liberia."

"On Features' Acc't there is a balance in hand of \$10,081.80. This extra balance results from the remittance of certain funds which will probably be demanded."

"The duties of Prof. Leavenworth & Corresponding Secretary have been assigned to Rev. Dr. Cole with a salary of \$250 a year — the Rev. Mr. Phillips, John Nelson Dulles &c having successively resigned the second Vice-Chairman's under pressure of other duties.

Burton & Fowles Drelles appointed at the last meeting, reported that they had given further consideration to the subject & had forwarded to the Secy of the Parent Socy, in Wash<sup>n</sup>, a Preamble & Resolution, under date of Apr. 28<sup>th</sup>, <sup>which</sup> calling attention to "the critical state of affairs" in Liberia, appeals to the American Col. Socy to send an address, in the name of the President, Secy, & Executive Committee of that body, to Liberia, for general circulation among the officers of the Government & the people at large, calling upon them to reduce expenses to sound limits; to consider their personal interest; & to show their patriotism in paying necessary taxation. This appeal <sup>was made</sup> to the Parent Socy in the belief that, under GOD, the voice of that great Christian Socy might prove influential in rousing the people.

In connection with this report, the letter from Mr. Copping, under date of May 13<sup>th</sup>, was read, acknowledging the receipt of the above Preamble & Resolution, - to be presented at the next meeting of the Executive Com<sup>tee</sup>, calling attention, however, to the fact that Pres. Latimer & the Executive Com<sup>tee</sup> did, last June, address Pres. Johnson; copies of which action Pres. Johnson had said would be "placed in the hands of the members of the Legislature at once". There was enclosed a copy of that portion of the "Statement of the proceedings of the Executive Com<sup>tee</sup>" read at the meeting of the Board of Directors last

a Secy, pro tem. till the end say of Apr.", he might  
then "be able to return." The Rev. Dr. also offered sug.

gestions as to the choosing of a successor in office & expresses sincere satisfaction in looking back upon the uninterrupted harmonious character of his relations with the Bd. during his term of office. He reported his having seen all persons connected with Liberia to whom he could possibly find access, "notably the New Consul Genl. Edw. Gudgeon Esq. & Arthur Please Esq. The Bd. desired to express

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The Board of Managers report to the 59<sup>th</sup> Annual Meeting of the Socy that, in regard to our most important work - the sending of emigrants to Liberia - \$3000 has been appropriated for this purpose during the past year. Beside wh., the sum of \$212. 50 contributed towards the salary of Miss Jennie E. Davis now Mrs Jesse Sharp, as Principal of the Female Dept. of Liberia College. The no. of emigrants reported by the Parent Socy as having been assisted, since our last annual report, is 46 who sailed from N.Y. in the bark "Monrovia" Feb. 28<sup>th</sup> 1885. The "Lardner" is expected to sail from N.Y. about Nov. 1<sup>st</sup> & the "Monrovia" Feb. 1<sup>st</sup> 1886. In view of the large amt. annually contributed by this auxiliary Socy & of poor character of many of the emigrants who have been sent out, the Bd. has seen well to pass the following Resolution "That this Bd. regards with concern the evil reports coming to us from Liberia concerning emigrants. That we are aware of the difficulties to be encountered, but are desirous that the Am. L. Col. Socy will use the utmost circumspection in the choice of emigrants hereafter". And the Bd. has instructed the Secy p.t. to send a copy of this Resolution to the Secy of the A. B. S. in Wash<sup>g</sup>. In view of question

*governor*  
touching the subject of the labors & salaries of Miss Davis & Miss Scott, a Comm. on Education was appointed, consisting of Rev. Dr. Drillis & Sylo & Messrs Morris & Rev. A. Elwyn, who also, were requested to draft a circular making an appeal for contributions. This the comm. did, at the same time reporting "that, in view of the limited amt. of fund now in our hands; applicable to this object, they could recommend no further appropriations to be made beyond the annual contribution of \$150 towards the salary of Miss Jessie E. Davis." The Bd. ordered that this report & the accompanying circular be put into the hands of the Delegates to Washington. During the winter Miss Davis was married to Mr. Jesse Sharp, one of the richest men in Liberia. In view of this fact, & of rumors that Mr. Sharp was drawing salaries from several quarters, the Bd. appointed a comm. consisting of Mr. Morris & the Secr pro tem. to ascertain what sums Mr. Sharp might be, in all, receiving, & from what sources. In pursuance of these directions the Secr pro tem. wrote Mr. Bop. Binger, who replied, that Mr. J. L. Brown, Secr of the Trustees of Donations, had written him from Boston under date of Oct. 27<sup>th</sup> 84 as follows: "The Trustees have pt. Miss Davis, as teacher, at the rate of \$300 per annum, & have now authorized an additional appropriation of \$100 per annum if th

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born. of finance determine that the income of the Bd. will warrant". Mr. Boppinger also stated that the Govt. of Liberia appropriated \$300 a year for the salary of Miss Davis, its check however being hard to get cashed at half the face value. In view of all these facts the Bd. resolved "that the salary of Mrs. Sharp & Mrs. Davis be paid up to the close of the present year & that the payment shall then cease".

'At the Feb. meeting the Secy submitted the draft of a circular, soliciting contributions & calling attention to the Report of the Pastor Secy. This, after amendments, was approved & ordered to be printed & mailed to influential parties & Editors, in conjunction with the Report of the borns. on Emigration. In accordance with wh. instructions, there were 1000 copies mailed during the spring.

In regard to <sup>the</sup> Condition of Liberia, the Bd. will report that the Republic has passed thro' the agitation after Presidential election, wh. resulted in the defeat of Edw. W. Blyden, supposed to be in strong sympathy with English aggression, & the re-election of Pres. H. R. W. Johnson. On the falling due after the Loan of 1871, however, a crisis in the affairs of the Republic has been reached. Early in the spring Pres. Johnson wrote proposing to visit this country with reference to the paying off of said loan. The Board

theron appointed a Spec. Comm. on the Situation in Liberia, consisting of Dr. Saub & Syle & Mr. Morris, with whom were afterward joined Messrs. Burton, Dulles. This comm. has reported; that they sent to Pres. Johnson a Resolution advising against his proposed visit. <sup>that</sup> Pres. Johnson was authorized by the Legislature to make the proposed visit & \$4500 were appropriated for that purpose, but the comm. reported that he had finally recd from his intention in accordance with this recommendation. The comm. reported correspondence with the Secy of the Parent Soc. in Wash<sup>n</sup>, further, that they had forwarded to him a Petition & Resolution asking for an address, to be put in general circulation in Liberia, the consideration of which was referred by the Executive comm. They also reported that the U.S. Govt. is being strongly urged to aid & protect Liberia; in reference to wh. fact, inc. have invited Dr. Lanson of N.Y. to meet the Board.

The annual Meeting at Washington was duly attended, the following gent<sup>r</sup> being appointed Rev. Drs. Schenck, S. E. Ap. plton & Syle, Rev. A. Leogn & Mr. Burton; Messrs. Morris & Dulles alternatis. Dr. Ap. plton being unable to attend Mr. Morris filled the vacancy; while it was resolved that here after Delegates unable to attend shall be considered

as authorized

to appoint substitutes for among the Bd.

The Bd. regretfully announced the death during the past year of our esteemed President Eli K. Price; & of two members of our Board, Bishop Simpson & Mr. Montelius Esq.; of two of our Vice Presidents Rev Dr. Edgar & Rear Admiral Marston.

The Rt. Rev. W<sup>r</sup> Bacon

Stevens D.D. L.L.D was elected to the vacancy caused by the death of our late President; while the office of Vice-Pres. has been accepted by Mr. Marchant, & that of Director by Messrs. Longstreet, & Rev. Miss<sup>r</sup> Elwyn & Webb.

The Secy, Rev. Dr. Sibley, was granted leave of absence & upon his recommendation Mr. J.P. Hubbard Jr. was appointed to fill his place, as Secy pro. tem. The Rev. Dr. was requested when in England to collect facts bearing upon the situation in Liberia & to exert himself in the interest of that Republic. This he has, from time to time, reported his having done. But he now announces that, for the present at least, he will remain abroad & therefore tenders his resignation.

### AFRICA FOR THE AFRICANS.

#### Dr. Sunderland's Plea for the Rescue of Liberia from Land-grabbers.

Rev. Byron Sunderland, D. D., of Washington, occupied the pulpit of the West Spruce Street Presbyterian Church, Seventeenth and Spruce Streets, last night, and, by request of the Pennsylvania Colonization Society, repeated his address on African civilization and the Liberian question. Mr. Sunderland said:

In 1815 Paul Caffin, an African, who had for a long time been considering the matter, bought a ship, manned it and took forty of his people from this country back to the fatherland, whence 120,000 of them had been brought since 1800. This was the first colonization from America to Africa. He returned the next year and died shortly after his arrival. A few months later the American Colonization Society was born. Seventy years have gone and we have Liberia.

Now there are 7,000,000 people of Africa's blood on our soil to-day. They are free, to be sure, and some people say they should be satisfied. It is true that there is a divided opinion among Africans about Liberia. There are some who have no love for this society or their fatherland, and yet to-day, notwithstanding this fact, there are 500,000 colored people looking to the society to send them to Liberia. When President Roberts, of Liberia, was last here he said he would urge no colored man to leave this country, but as for himself he could not live in the United States. Emigrants are needed in Liberia. She is waiting to receive them.

Capitalists are organizing in all parts of Europe, encouraged by kings and emperors, for the express purpose of grabbing the land of Africa. It looks as if there were to be a general scramble for land—commercial adventure. When we reflect that Africa controls the diamond market, together with her many other resources, is it any wonder the European Mammon turns serpent's eyes on her lands?

It is scarcely twenty-five years ago that we recognized the free state of Liberia. Still her voice is not heard in the councils of the nations. While in diplomacy we are as exclusive as China itself, we should not hesitate to assist this struggling state to our utmost ability.

I want to say a word about African fever. It is fatal to the Caucasian. The natives are hearty, robust and strong, but as sure as white men enter their domain they die. It seems to say in plain terms, "This is why the sons of Ham are black. This is their land, and the climate can be endured only by them." It is the watch dog of Liberia.

It is necessary for us to pour into the South-eastern portion of Liberia within the next two years 10,000 of the choice Africans of this country to prevent that portion of the state being seized by foreign capitalists. To do this we must have \$1,000,000. We have not got the money in our society and must, therefore, get it from the Treasury of the United States. I am here to ask you, to beseech you, to send petitions to Congress for this amount. Can there be any question as to the legality of such an appropriation? I answer that millions are granted to expositions for subsidies and many other purposes, and even \$18,000 is appropriated for a congressman's funeral.

All of the mortgages accepted are secured by real estate valued at from 2 1/2 to more than 3 times the amount loaned and in every case is further secured by policies of insurance having been taken out in the Fire Insurance Company of the County of Philadelphia and duly transferred to the Society.

The Comm. further suggested the names of Robt. B. Davidson Esq. for President, & the names of Rev. Mess. A. Chapman D.D. & Rt. Rev. D.W. Whittaker D.D. for Vice-President. It was thereupon on motion Resolved that these names be recommended to the 61<sup>st</sup> Annual Meeting for election.

 renew its offer made under the Resolution of Jan. 13<sup>th</sup>  
 1887.

Thereupon it was on motion Resolved  
 that the Portraits of this Socy shall be insured to  
 the extent of \$5000 under the supervision of a Comm.  
 consisting of Rev. A.R. Elwyn & Miss Morris & Dulles.  
 And further it was Resolved that the Secy be au-  
 thorized to correspond with Mr. George Gorliss the  
 Secretary of "The Penn. Academy of the Fine Arts" with  
 reference to loaning this Socy's Portraits for the pro-  
 jected exhibition.

On motion the Board adjourned.
